

Project Goals

- Promote sustainable agriculture.
- Generate alternative income through carbon credits.

Impact (2022– Present)



- 46,036 farmers enrolled.
- Significant reduction in water consumption and greenhouse gas emissions.

Future Outlook

 The project plans to expand its reach, further reducing the environmental footprint of rice farming. Through ongoing collaboration, it aims to be a leading model of sustainable agriculture in the region.







Case Studies

Case Study 1: Transforming a Farmer's Life Through AWD

Aouragoni pedda raja goud, area; 4.16, a farmer from bramhanpally village, had been struggling with diminishing profits due to increasing water costs and erratic rainfall. In 2022, he attended a workshop on Alternative Wetting and Drying (AWD) conducted under the Sustainable Rice Production Project.





- Water Savings: He reduced irrigation by 30%, saving costs on electricity and water usage.
- Improved Yield: His rice yield increased by 10%, thanks to better soil geration.

Farmer shared his success story with fellow farmers, inspiring 25 others in his village to adopt AWD practices.

By implementing AWD techniques on his 4.16-acre paddy field, farmer noticed several benefits within one crop cycle:

→ Case Study 2: Empowering Women Farmers for Sustainability

Arla parshaiah, a small 2.70 -acre rice field in . High water costs and low yields left her struggling to meet ends. In early 2023, she joined the AWD project.

The combination of water-saving irrigation and increased crop productivity has led to a more sustainable and financially viable farming operation. Arla's case illustrates the potential of modern irrigation practices like AWD to help small-scale farmers overcome the challenges of water scarcity and low yields, fostering both economic stability and environmental sustainability.





To End Gender-Based Violence: Sakhi One Stop Centre (OSC)

This project, supported under the Government of India's Mission Sakthi scheme, is aimed at providing comprehensive support to women affected by gender-based violence. PSHE has been managing the Sakhi OSC in Kamareddy since 2023.

One Stop Centre/Sakhi Centre is based on the concept of integrated and coordinated team work of multispectral and inter agency network at one place for the relief and rehabilitation of survivors of violence against women with public health system as the focal point.



To provide integrated support and assistance to women affected by violence, both in private and public spaces under one roof.

To facilitate immediate, emergency and non-emergency access to a range of services including medical, legal, psychological and counselling support under one roof to fight against any forms






Project Goals

- To enable survivors to rebuild their lives through vocational training and rehabilitation programs.



- Kamareddy Since its Centre: Sakhi establishment, the OSC has supported 1,110 women, providing them with legal aid, counselling, and temporary shelter.
- Temporary shelter provided to 421 women, ensuring safety during critical periods.
- The 24/7 helpline has played a crucial role in the rescue and protection of several women.
- Outreach campaigns have sensitized 29,309 people on the issue of genderbased violence, contributing to longterm societal change.





Core Activities

- 24/7 Helpline: Offering round-the-clock support for women in distress.
- Immediate and Non-immediate Services: Includes emergency rescue, medical aid, legal support, and police intervention.
- Shelter Services: Temporary housing for women in need of immediate protection.
- Psycho-social Support: Counselling to help victims recover from trauma.
- Legal, Medical, and Police Aid: Facilitating access to legal representation, medical treatment, and police protection.
- Rescue Operations: Coordinating with law enforcement to safely extricate women from dangerous environments.
- Awareness Campaigns: Outreach programs to educate communities about gender-based violence and available services.
- Rehabilitation Services: Vocational training and long-term counselling to help women reintegrate into society.





Case Studies

→ Case Study 1: Rescuing and Rehabilitating a Survivor

Ms. Mounika (name changed) reached out to the Sakhi OSC helpline in distress after enduring domestic violence for several years. the team receiving her call, immediately coordinated a rescue operation with local police. She was provided with temporary shelter and medical assistance.

Team assisted her with shelter service, counselling, home visit, police assistance and legal support Counsellors worked closely with her to address her trauma, while legal advisors helped her file a protection order. Through vocational training programs, she acquired skills in tailoring, enabling her to secure stable employment. Ms. Mounika now leads an independent life, serving as an inspiration for other women in her community to speak up against violence.

→ Case Study 2: Empowering Through Legal Aid and Awareness

When Ms. Sneha (name changed) approached the Sakhi OSC, she was struggling to break free from domestic harassment. Sakhi awareness enlighten her with the legal provisions and support to address her situation.

She approached Sakhi for service. The Sakhi team analyzed her situation and recommended her for family counselling

The family counselling helped her to regain her confidence and also her family issues were addressed and solved with support of Sakhi psychosocial family counselling session. Also the team made het in law family aware about legal side of domestic violence they awareness and they corrected their behavior. Now they live as happy family and Sneha life is protected.

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Rural-Level HIV/AIDS Prevention – Link Workers Scheme

The Link Workers Scheme is a key HIV/AIDS addressing initiative prevention in rural areas. Launched in partnership with the Telangana State AIDS Control Society (TSACS), this project operates across 100 villages in the Karimnagar **Joint** District (Peddapally, Jagityal, and Siricilla) since 2020. It primarily focuses on highrisk groups such as Female Sex Workers (FSWs), Men who have Sex with Men (MSMs), People Living with HIV (PLHIV), and other vulnerable populations like migrant workers and truck drivers.

Objectives

Reaching out to vulnerable populations and High-risk group

Increasing condom use: increase the use of condoms among HRGs and other vulnerable populations

Establishing referral linkages: referral and follow-up linkages for various services,treatment for STIs etc

Reducing stigma and discrimination

Building a rural community model

The LWS targets populations with high-risk behaviors, including female sex workers (FSW), men-who-have-sex-with-men (MSM), transgenders (TG), injecting drug users (IDUs), and bridge populations (truckers and migrants).

Staff Strength

26 team members, including DRP, data staff, and field staff.

Activities:

- HIV Testing & Screening: Conducted 4,580 screenings to identify high-risk individuals.
- Hotspot Identification: Mapped key areas frequented by vulnerable populations, like truck routes and migrant communities.
- Prevention Campaigns: Organized workshops and community meetings to raise awareness and educate on HIV/AIDS prevention.
- Support Services: Offered medical, emotional, and social support to 8,339 individuals living with HIV/AIDS.



Project Goals

- Reduce new HIV infections by enhancing access to testing and prevention services.
- Decrease HIV/AIDS stigma, especially in rural areas.
- Improve the quality of life for people living with HIV by providing sustained support.
- Ensure regular monitoring and screening of high-risk populations.




Key Approaches:

- Screening: Comprehensive screening to detect and support HIV-positive individuals.
- Hotspot Mapping: Identifying and targeting high-risk areas for focused interventions.
- Awareness Programs: Reducing stigma and raising awareness through continuous public engagement in rural settings.
- **Direct Support:** Ensuring access to healthcare and emotional support for those diagnosed with HIV/AIDS.



Impact and Outcomes:

inception, the project has 8,339 individuals, directly benefited including 1,814 women. Through awareness campaigns and social support, the project is steadily reducing the stigma associated with HIV/AIDS and improving community acceptance. Looking forward, the aim is to extend these efforts further within the 100 villages continue decreasing new infections while promoting social integration for people living with HIV/AIDS.







Case Studies

→ Case Study 1: Reaching Out to the Marginalized

Mr. A, a 35-year-old truck driver, was unaware of the largely associated with unprotected sex and the importance of regular health check-ups. Through the Link Workers Scheme, field staff identified him as part of a high-risk group during a hotspot mapping activity. Mr. A participated in an HIV awareness campaign organized community, where he learned about the importance of regular screenings and preventive measures.

Following a screening organized under the scheme, Mr. A tested positive for HIV. The team provided immediate emotional and medical support, connecting him with nearby healthcare facilities for treatment. Additionally, they introduced him to a peer support group, where he could openly share his experiences and gain strength from others in similar situations. Today, Mr. Α is antiretroviral therapy (ART) and participates actively in local campaigns to educate others about HIV prevention.

→ Case Study 2: Empowering Vulnerable Women

Ms. B, a 29-year-old mother of two, worked as a migrant laborer. She faced considerable stigma and lacked access to reliable healthcare. During a community awareness program conducted by the Link Workers Scheme, Ms. B learned about the risks of HIV and the importance of early detection. Motivated by the session, she underwent HIV screening and tested positive.

The project team supported Ms. B in accessing free treatment and helped her navigate the challenges of living with HIV. Beyond medical aid, she benefited from counseling services, which strengthened her emotional resilience. With the guidance of the field staff, Ms. B began participating in community meetings to reduce the stigma surrounding HIV/AIDS. She now serves as a local advocate, encouraging others to seek testing and support services
